Table 1 compares survey completion rates among Member of Parliaments' (MP) offices, broken down by MP party affiliation, gender, and region. Staff in Conservative MPs' offices were the least likely to complete the survey, with just over half (56%) reporting at least one complete, compared to 64% in Liberal offices, 80% in New Democratic Party (NDP) offices, and 84% in Bloc Québécois offices. Gender differences were also apparent: Staff in women MPs' offices were more engaged, with 72% of offices reporting at least one complete, compared to 61% in men MPs' offices. Regional variation was less pronounced, though staff in Québec MPs' office had the highest completion rates (73%). Overall, completion rates varied across MP party and gender, with the lowest engagement among staff working for Conservative MPs and men MPs, and the highest among Bloc Québécois and NDP MPs and women MPs.

Table 2 compares the composition of the staffer and MP survey samples to the overall makeup of the House of Commons in 2023. Table 2 shows that the staffer survey sample was majority women (54%). Looking at the MPs staff work for, staffers were distributed across parties and regions that closely mirrored the House of Commons: 44% work for Liberal MPs, 28% for Conservative MPs, 12% for NDP MPs, and 13% for Bloc MPs, with regional and government position representation broadly consistent with the House of Commons.

The MP survey sample itself was also highly representative of the House of Commons. About one-third of participating MPs were women (36%, compared to 31% in the House of Commons), with regional breakdowns nearly identical to the Chamber's composition: 34% from Ontario, 25% from Québec, 30% from the West, and 10% from Atlantic provinces. Party balance was relatively proportional as well, with 47% of MP respondents belonging to the Liberal party, 35% Conservative,



9% Bloc, and 8% NDP. The share of cabinet ministers (13%) nearly matched their proportion in the House of Commons (12%).
